You may be surprised to find out that you are. See if you meet any ONE of the criteria below. If you're not sure, don't hesitate to contact us: 01768 216500 or cosyhomes@cafs.org.uk.

#### Health criteria - anyone with one of these:

- ·Cardiovascular condition (inc. Coronary heart disease, stroke, hypertension, transient ischemic attack)
- ·Respiratory condition (inc. COPD, asthma)
- ·Neurological or neurobiological condition (inc. Dementia, Parkinson's disease, MS, epilepsy, fibromyalgia, ME)
- ·Musculoskeletal conditions (inc. Arthritis, limited mobility, recently attended hospital due to a fall)
- ·Blood conditions (inc. Sickle cell disease, thalassaemia)
- ·Cancer
- ·Moderate to severe mental illness (inc. Schizophrenia, bipolar disorder and depression where receiving regular treatment)
- ·Severe learning difficulties
- ·Autoimmune or immunodeficiency diseases (inc. Lupus, diabetes, HIV)
- ·Terminally ill
- ·Other illness exacerbated by cold (confirmed by a GP)
- In possession of a valid NHS Medical Exemption Certificate.

#### Vulnerability criteria

Anyone in one of these situations:

- ·Victim of domestic violence
- ·Recent bereavement
- ·Moving in and out of homelessness
- ·Recent immigrant or asylum seeker
- ·Physical or sensory disability
- ·Have ECO-Flex Declaration from you council
- ·Be registered on the Priority Services Register
- ·Households with children under the age of 5
- ·Households with elderly over the age of 65


#### Income criteria

Anyone receiving one of these:

- ·Employment and Support Allowance
- ·Jobseekers Allowance
- ·Income Support
- ·Pension Credit
- ·Child Tax Credit
- ·Working Tax Credit
- ·Universal Credit
- ·Carer's Allowance
- ·Housing Benefit or Council Tax reduction
- ·A disability benefit (inc. Attendance allowance, DLA, PIP)
- ·MOD administered benefits

A close neighbour- The
Duddon Valley - is
witnessing landscape
changes - the following
article produced by Friends
of the Lake District gives an
insight into this project



Last week members of our staff visited Hardknott Forest in the Duddon Valley to find out more about the restoration of one of the largest conifer plantations in the Lake District National Park and to see the difference our Landscape Grant to help with non native tree removal has made. We met with John Hodgson, Restoring Hardknott Forest Project Officer and some of the team working hard to remove the non-native conifers. The project is working to create a woodland that is as natural as possible. The remote location and difficult road access means that timber production is not financially viable, creating a unique opportunity to restore the 630 hectare plantation to native woodland. Native species are mostly naturally regenerating, so once non-natives are removed, native trees such as oak, birch, holly, willow and rowan will reseed naturally. There is still work for the team and volunteers to do, but the difference to the landscape is already impressive to see
