Design a garden for wildlife Sponsor: Cumbria Wildlife Trust Think of all the creatures that might visit a garden: birds, hedgehogs, frogs, toads, bees, butterflies and other insects for example.

What do they need? Where do they like to make their homes? What do they like to eat? Design a garden that will attract as many wildlife species as possible.

To enter, take a sheet of A4 paper, leave a margin around the outside and design your garden in the centre; you can draw it, paint it or do a collage. Think of all the things you could have in your garden to make creatures want to visit it. Then use the margin to label each feature and explain why you have included it.

Green Matters.....

Solar Made Easy

It is summer and is the sunshine (and high energy prices) turning your mind to solar energy?

The Solar Made Easy project is coordinating clusters of homes within communities with a view to providing access to installers. Currently many solar installer's are focused on larger commercial properties but if there are a number of properties in a community there are installers who are happy to provide quotes and installation.


As part of this project the roofs that have a potential for solar in the Duddon Valley area (extends from Kirkby in the East to The Hill in the West) are shown on a map here: https://codeclass.co.uk/duddon-valley/. This suggests that of 2249 suitable roofs in this area there could be 10.7 GWh estimated annual power generation. (Note that there could be multiple roofs at one address).

A few quick hints for using the map:

- · A quick way of zooming in and out of the map on a desktop is to use a mouse wheel.
- Roof areas are ordered by id number: roof number 1 is the roof that has been calculated to produce the biggest power output etc
- By moving the mouse pointer over a roof area, summary details can be viewed id number, OS map coordinates (northings and eastings) and solar output of that roof area.
- The map itself is based on open source OpenStreetMap data.

It is possible to search for individual roof areas by the identification number ("id"). So, for example, to search for the roof area with the largest solar potential, this will have an "id" value of "1". Click on the red binocular square in the top left of the map and insert "1" into the field that appears. The map will scroll to that part of the map and the roof will be outlined in blue. There is a spreadsheet t cross reference the map.

Your Recycling Service Is Changing



Why we are making the changes

We want to make recycling as easy as possible, and the changes will result in less sorting for residents to do.

There will be extra room for recyclables and the more weather-resistant lids will prevent litter from being blown into the street.

The new fleet of vehicles will have lower carbon emissions, and this collection system requires fewer vehicles in total – making it better for the environment all-round.

Your new bins

The new bins will be delivered from **October to December** this year, and people can start using them as soon as they are received. We will write to property owners with a delivery timeframe.

A blue-lidded bin will replace the blue paper box and cardboard recycling bag, and a red-lidded bin will hold glass, plastic and metal.

If a property does not have the space to accommodate two extra bins, they will be contacted by the council to organise an alternative.
