Work To Start on New Path

A new path linking The Green to Rising Hill will commence over the next few weeks.

We all aware of the speed and scale of the traffic that runs through our Villages, and to walk on the road side for residents at Rising Hill is a big challenge to keep and feel safe whilst walking into The Green.

The Parish Council has been working with residents to explore the options and crucially source the funding for this new pathway.

Following the development of a business case, the Ghyll Scaur Quarry Road Fund will meet the construction costs of this new path.

We appreciate your support noting there is likely be some level of disruption as the path is constructed.

It is expected this path will be up and running over the next few months and meets one of the Parish Councils key targets within our **Community Plan** to improve the connectivity within our communities.

Green Matters..... Communities Come Together for Spring Clean

KEEPING CUMBERLAND TIDY: Community groups collected around 600 kg of litter from roadside verges in Millom Without and Duddon parishes

Three community groups have worked together to clear an estimated 600 kg of litter from local road verges as part of the Keep Britain Tidy campaign.

The massive haul was made by members of Thwaites WI, Millom Without Environment Group and Sustainable Duddon who worked at The Green on the A5093, either side of Duddon bridge on the A595, and along the Corney Fell road. Covering a combined stretch of six kilometers, on 26 March and 1 April volunteers collected 60 large bags of litter: 30 from Duddon Bridge approaches and High Cross Brow; 20 from Corney Fell; six from The Green, and four at the bottom of Buckman Brow.

In addition to countless plastic and glass bottles; drinks cans and cartons; crisp packets; sweet wrappers and food packaging; hub caps, smashed wing mirrors and other car components, more unusual items were dealt with. They included an oil drum, a pair of rigger boots, a towel and abandoned road signs. Millom Without Environment Group member, Elaine Essery, said: "One group removed two dead sheep from a water course to reduce contamination. Volunteers also noted a total of 21 fly-tipped car tyres which were reported to the councils."

Litter pickers were encouraged by toots from passing motorists and words of support from cyclists and local residents. Essery added: "A number of residents stopped to support the litter-picking operation and explain how they keep areas around them clear of litter as they pass through, which is good to know."

Arrangements were made with the relevant councils for the bagged-up litter to be collected from given locations.

The initiative took place during the Great British Spring Clean fortnight. Now in its eighth year and organised by Keep Britain Tidy, the Great British Spring Clean is the nation's biggest mass-action environmental campaign



We are very fortunate to live in an area that is surrounded by stunning landscapes and beautiful rivers. However, with recent press coverage around the worsening pollution of our nation's waterways, and the concerns expressed by environmental groups that legislation is not tough enough, monitoring and looking after our local rivers has become more important than ever.

Duddon River Association (DRA), which was formed 15 years ago, is a group of volunteers and agencies who have come together to improve our local rivers for wildlife. We cover all the rivers that flow into the Duddon estuary, including: the Duddon, Lickle, Kirkby Pool and Black Beck. Part of the South Cumbria Rivers Trust (SCRT, a registered charity), we work together to monitor the habitats and improve the health of the river system. We believe that improving the riverine environment for wildlife will also have a long lasting benefit on our local community and visitors throughout our beautiful region.

We would love to get more people involved in the work that we do. We are particularly looking for volunteers to help with our next Himalayan balsam bashing drive which will take place in June and July. Removing this pretty but invasive non-native species is one of our priorities as it can quickly take over vast areas of our riverbanks forming a monoculture and reducing biodiversity.
