Solar Lights Consultation

The Parish Council wish to thank all the participants who took the time to express their views and thoughts on the potential installation of Solar Lights from Green Road Station to the end of Middle Cut.

From this feedback, it is apparent there is overwhelming support for this project and there are a number of key areas the PC need to develop in producing a specification that meets locals needs.

Key areas from the feedback include:

- 1. Consider lighting locations taking account of Green Road Station existing available lights
- 2. Address a number technical issues relating to the reliability and consistency of the solar lights
- 3. Ensure all costs are understood for the lifetime installation of the lights

A working group is now reviewing the consultation feedback and we will continue to communicate further updates as we make progress on this new project.

The Thwaites playgroup started 31 January in 2022 and so is now 1 year old. 
Free Apple Grafting Course

With a bit of expert guidance, creating your own apple trees through grafting cuttings onto rootstock is surprisingly easy. Whether you are interested in planting traditional local varieties, or would simply like to create your own free tree of a popular modern variety for your garden, it is worth trying your hand at apple grafting. In addition, if you are successful, you will get free apples with no carbon miles for many years to come.

Local sustainability group Sustainable Duddon has arranged an apple grafting course to take place in the village hall at The Hill, on Saturday 4th March. It will run from 10:00 to 12:00. Our tutor is from the South Lakes Orchard Group, so participants will be given expert guidance. Additionally a choice of rootstocks will be available, as well as cuttings from different apple trees grown locally.

The course is funded by the National Lottery Community Fund and is part of the Zero Carbon Cumbria Partnership's ambitious emission reduction programme to make Cumbria carbon neutral by 2037.

Coastal running festival launched - Run The Edge



A MULTI-TERRAIN running festival will be held on Copeland's coast in May, as part of the Connecting Cumbria's Hidden Coast programme.

Run The Edge – organised by the Millom Striders running club on behalf of Copeland Borough Council - will take place around the breathtaking Duddon Estuary area on Sunday, May 21.

It will welcome competitors to two routes that take in the picturesque coastline, plus as a family fun run and other activities.

Copeland's Elected Mayor, Mike Starkie, said: "This event will spotlight our amazing coastline as a unique destination for anyone who loves the outdoors.

"The adventure economy is a key part of the visitor industry - it's something we want to support and help businesses make the most of. This coast is a hidden gem and I'm delighted we've attracted funding for events like this - it benefits locals but also showcases the area to the rest of the UK and beyond. It supports jobs and businesses and promotes healthy activity – I hope people come from far and wide to take part."

The Run The Edge event will include:

- An 11.4km (seven-mile) race for people aged 16+, starting at 11am. This will start at The Ski Bar and run alongside the sea before heading around Millom, then back to the coast at Hodbarrow RSPB nature reserve and back to the start point.
- A largely coastal 5.1km (three-mile) race for anyone aged over 12 years. This will also start at 11am, and begin and end at The Ski Bar.
- A 1km (0.6-mile) family-friendly fun run.

Both race routes will be signposted and include km markers. A safe storage area will be available along with various refreshments, and there will be a water station on the longer route.

Pre-booked entry to each of the two main events costs £16, or £14 for affiliated athletes. Entry on the day is £16 for everyone. Competitors will receive a T-shirt, medal, neck warmer and eco-friendly water bottle on completion. Entry to the fun run costs £2 and participants will receive a goodie bag. Entries to the fun run will only be taken on the day.

Andrew Rigg, Chairman of the Millom Striders, said: "Both events will take in scenic views of the Duddon Estuary (an SSSI site) and of the Lake District's southern fells towards Black Combe, White Combe, Coniston Old Man and Scafell Pike. Both events will be chip-timed and will, in the main, follow the Cumbria Coastal path.

Gary McKeating, Head of Development and Community at Sellafield Ltd, said: "As a keen runner myself I look forward to showcasing our stunning coastline to a wide variety of visitors and residents. Adventure tourism is an important part of our future economy and we hope that local businesses get involved and benefit from what will be a fantastic festival."

The event is part of the Connecting Cumbria's Hidden Coast programme, which is led by Copeland Borough Council and funded with £1.15m from Sellafield Ltd and more than £1m from the government's Coastal Communities Fund. It aims to inspire visitors to Copeland's coast, promote health and wellbeing and raise awareness of the area in the rest of the UK. As well as the coastal running festival, it includes a new beach cafe at Silecroft, several new cycle and footpath routes and an extensive arts programme, Deep Time.
